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### Latest News

- The House and Senate were not in session this week. When the House returns next week, it is expected to consider a Resolution of Disapproval of the President's recent emergency declaration on the border. The Senate will also be in session.
- **FY 2019 Appropriations** - The FY 2019 Consolidated Appropriations Act was signed into law on February 15. This bill included funding for most law enforcement and homeland security grants and programs. You can find the BBM summary of the legislation [here](#).
- **Issuance of National Emergency Declaration** - On February 15, President Trump issued a presidential proclamation, declaring a national emergency concerning the southern border. The declaration is expected to give the President leeway in redirecting approximately \$3.5 billion Congress appropriated for military construction projects to securing the border. Additionally, the President will use his executive authority to reprogram \$2.5 billion from the DOD's drug interdiction efforts and \$600 million from the Treasury Departments drug forfeiture program. Democratic leaders in the House have stated they will move immediately to consider a Resolution of Disapproval, potentially forcing consideration in the Senate as well. Additionally, multiple states and other entities have already begun filing lawsuits challenging the declaration.
- **New DAG Announced** - President Trump announced that he intends to nominate Jeffrey Rosen to become the next Deputy Attorney General, once current DAG Rod Rosenstein leaves in March. Rosen is currently the Deputy Secretary of the Department of Transportation.
- **New FEMA Administrator Announced** - President Trump announced that he intends to nominate Jeffrey Byard to become the next Administrator of FEMA. Byard is currently the associate administrator for the Office of Response and Recovery, and previously held several positions with the Alabama Emergency Management Agency. Byard would succeed Brock Long who resigned last week.
- **2018 Blue Alert Year-End Summary** - The COPS Office recently released the 2018 year-end summary of law enforcement officers shot in the line of duty. The COPS Office tracks this data to better understand the nature and frequency of incidents that could give rise to the issuance of a Blue Alert. You can view the report [here](#).
- **Drug & Violence Prevention Training Conference** - Law Enforcement Against Drugs (LEADS) will be holding its 4th annual conference in Atlantic City on March 17-19. **New problem for legal weed: Exploding pot factories****Politico | Rebecca Rainey**

States are facing a new danger as legal marijuana spreads across the country: Explosions and fires at cannabis factories are sending workers to the hospital with severe burns, revealing the nascent industry's lack of proper safety standards. In the 33 states where the drug is legal for medical or recreational use, at least 10 fires or explosions have occurred in the past five years at facilities that extract hash oil used in edible products. Deputy Attorney General Rod J. Rosenstein plans to leave the Justice Department in mid-March, an official familiar with the matter said Monday night, and an announcement on his successor is expected imminently. Rosenstein, the No. 2 Justice Department official who has spent nearly two years in the hot seat since appointing Robert S. Mueller III to lead an investigation into whether President Trump's campaign conspired with Russia to interfere in the 2016 election, had made it known in recent weeks that he planned to leave if and when a new attorney general was confirmed by the Senate. **Continue reading [here](#).**

In his current post, the 60-year-old Rosen serves as the Transportation Department's chief operating officer and is in charge of implementing the department's safety and technological priorities. Senate HELP Committee - Full Committee Hearing - February 12

[Managing Pain During the Opioid Crisis](#)

**Summary:** This hearing examined efforts to reduce opioid abuse and deaths, while also ensuring that those who have chronic pain receives the care and treatment needed to address their condition. Concerns have been raised by some that by restricting access to opioids, we are hindering treatment to those suffering from chronic pain. Witnesses testified that there is a need for alternative pain management treatments, and that pharmacists can help ensure that patients are using opioids safely and effectively. Additionally, more research and investment needs to be made to discover effective new safer treatment options.

**Summary:** To require the Director of the Government Publishing Office to establish and maintain a website accessible to the public that allows the public to obtain electronic copies of all congressionally mandated reports in one place, and for other purposes.

**[S. 406 - Federal Rotational Cyber Workforce Program Act of 2019](#)**

**Status:** Approved by the Senate Homeland Security Committee on 2/13.

**Summary:** A bill to establish a Federal rotational cyber workforce program for the Federal cyber workforce.

**[S. 315 - DHS Cyber Hunt and Incident Response Teams Act of 2019](#)**

**Status:** Approved by the Senate Homeland Security Committee on 2/13.

**Summary:** To authorize cyber hunt and incident response teams at the Department of Homeland Security, and for other purposes.

**[S. 333 - National Cybersecurity Preparedness Consortium Act of 2019](#)**

**Status:** Approved by the Senate Homeland Security Committee on 2/13.

**Summary:** A bill to authorize the Secretary of Homeland Security to work with cybersecurity consortia for training, and for other purposes.

**[S. 387 - Fair Chance Act](#)**

**Status:** Approved by the Senate Homeland Security Committee on 2/13.

**Summary:** A bill to prohibit Federal agencies and Federal contractors from requesting that an applicant for employment disclose criminal history record information before the applicant has received a conditional offer, and for other purposes.

**[H.R. 504 - DHS Field Engagement Accountability Act](#)**

**Status:** Approved by the Senate Homeland Security Committee on 2/13.

**Summary:** This bill requires the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to develop and update at least once every five years a strategy for DHS engagement with fusion centers. The term "fusion center" means a collaborative effort of two or more government agencies that combines resources, expertise, or information to maximize the ability of such agencies to detect, prevent, investigate, apprehend, and respond to criminal or terrorist activity. The Office of Intelligence and Analysis of DHS shall provide personnel and support to fusion centers, publish performance metrics for DHS field personnel assigned to fusion centers, and develop and implement training for fu-



sion center personnel. DHS intelligence and information components shall develop policies and metrics to ensure effective use of the unclassified Homeland Security Information Sharing Network and shall assess and implement enhancements to improve such network.

House Homeland Security Committee - Full Committee Hearing - February 13

[Defending Our Democracy: Building Partnerships to Protect America's Elections](#)

**Summary:** This hearing examined efforts to protect our election systems from potential attacks. Witnesses testified that as with any IT system, potential threats will always exist, and we must do more to protect its vulnerabilities. Additionally, we need to do more to invest in auditability to ensure the integrity of the system. Also, basic cyber hygiene was discussed such as helping with patching, helping implement multifactor authentication, and helping on phishing campaign assessments. Witnesses were also asked about the ISAC model and whether it would work with securing our political infrastructure and campaigns.

House Financial Services Committee - Consumer Protection and Financial Institutions Subcommittee Hearing - February 13

[Challenges and Solutions: Access to Banking Services for Cannabis-Related Businesses](#)

**Summary:** This hearing examined providing access to banking services for the marijuana industry. The hearing focused extensively on the Secure and Fair Enforcement Banking Act, which would provide protections to banks and their employees from federal prosecution for doing business with state legalized marijuana companies. Some witnesses testified that the current conflict between state and federal laws have created confusion and legal uncertainty for community banks. Some members of the committee however criticized any attempt to create a safe harbor for banks as long as federal law making marijuana illegal is still on the books.

**Status:** Approved by the House on 2/11.

**Summary:** This legislation directs the Office of Management and Budget to report on the examination of social media activity during security clearance investigations.

#### [H.R. 995](#) - Settlement Agreement Information Database Act of 2019

**Status:** Approved by the House on 2/13.

**Summary:** This legislation would require the text of settlement agreements involving federal agencies would have to be posted online. The measure would apply to any agency settlements, including consent decrees, that relate to alleged violations of federal law.

#### [H.J.Res. 31](#) - Making consolidated appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2019

**Status:** Signed by the President on 2/15; Approved by the House on 2/14; Approved by the Senate on 2/14.

**Summary:** The bill funds nine federal departments and dozens of agencies including the Departments of Justice and Homeland Security. The bill includes \$329.6 million (topline of \$423.5 million) for Byrne JAG, a \$10 million cut from FY 2018, \$640 million for the Urban Area Security Initiative, a \$10 million increase, and \$525 million for the State Homeland Security Grant, an \$18 million increase. Additionally, the bill includes \$37 million for RISS. The agreement also includes \$1.375 billion for border security, short of the \$5.7 billion the President requested. **Read the BBM bill summary** [here](#).
