- The House and Senate were in session this week, with the House considering reauthorization of the Violence Against Women Act. This reauthorization includes the reauthorization of the Debbie Smith Act. The House also considered multiple homeland security related bills. The Senate continued consideration of disaster assistance legislation. The Senate Judiciary Committee has placed the Debbie Smith Act Reauthorization legislation on their markup schedule this week, however, as is customary, the bill was held over for one week. The House and Senate Appropriations Committees held multiple hearings, including a hearing on the FY 2020 FEMA budget request and FBI budget request.
- **CLIENT IN THE SPOTLIGHT** - The growing situation of refugees and migrants attempting to cross the southern border has strained our limited resources and has shined a spotlight on the ever growing concerns of human trafficking. Federal legalization of hemp arrived in the U.S. late last year and expanded an industry already booming because of the skyrocketing popularity of CBDs, a compound in hemp that many see as a health aid. But now, just a few months after Congress placed the marijuana look-alike squarely in safe legal territory, the hemp industry has been unsettled by an unexpected development. Truckers, now free to haul hemp from state to state, have been stopped and sometimes arrested by police who can't tell whether they have intercepted a legal agricultural crop or the biggest marijuana bust of their careers. That's because the only way to distinguish hemp and marijuana, which look and smell alike, is by measuring their tetrahydrocannabinol, or THC, and officers don't have the testing technology to do so on the spot. **Continue reading [here](#).**

Authorities in China already regulate 25 variants of fentanyl, a synthetic opioid linked to thousands of drug overdose deaths in the U.S. But some manufacturers in China, seeking to evade controls, have introduced slight changes to the molecular structure of their drugs, giving them the legal

Senate Judiciary Committee - Full Committee Hearing - March 26

[Red Flag Laws: Examining Guidelines for State Action](#)

Summary: This hearing examined red flag laws, which allows law enforcement or individuals to petition a judge to have an individuals firearms removed from their possession if they are deemed in be in danger of harming themselves or others. Senators heard from both sides of the issue, those who believe red flag laws can prevent violence and suicide, and those who have concerns that any red flag law needs to ensure due process and uphold ones Second Amendment rights. Overall, Senators expressed support federal grants to encourage states to establish a process for law enforcement and the public to petition the courts to temporarily remove firearms from those who pose an immediate threat to themselves or others. Though some members cautioned that ample due process must be in place and it must be driven at the state level. Separately, some Senators spoke in support of separate legislation that would require federal authorities to notify local law enforcement should an individual who is not eligible to own a gun but tries to buy one. Additionally, some Senators spoke in favor of additional legislation that would go further to regulate guns, including universal background checks and assault weapons bans.

House Homeland Security Committee - Border Security Subcommittee Hearing - March 26

[The Department of Homeland Security's Family Separation Policy: Perspectives from the Border](#)

Summary: This hearing continued to examine the Administration's family separation policy. Members of the committee heard from immigrant, children, and victims advocates. Some witnesses expressed concerns that not all children were reunited with their parents upon their parents deportation. Additionally, one witness testified about the concerns with children being separated from their families long before they reach the U.S. border, separated by traffickers and cartels using them to take advantage of our current immigration and asylum policies. Witnesses also testifying that increased refugee processing in the home country would avoid an individual from making the dangerous journey to the U.S. and avoid being trafficked by cartels. Members of the committee and witnesses also discussed the physical and mental health of the children who have been separated and also the stresses of the journey they undertook to reach the U.S.

Summary: At this hearing the role of the Coast Guard in interdicting drugs coming to the U.S. through our waterways was discussed. Witnesses stated that due to limited resources, only about 25 percent of the known intelligence is being acted upon. With additional resources, more can be done. Though there is a balance that needs to be made with limited resources to address other national security needs.
