- The House and Senate were in session this week, with Attorney General Barr testifying before the House and Senate CJS Appropriations Subcommittee on the DOJ's FY 2020 budget proposal. However, most of the questioning revolved around the Mueller investigation. The Senate Homeland Security Committee held a hearing on the border crisis. After completing legislative business this week, both chambers will adjourn for the next two weeks, and return on April 29.

  - ⇒ **CICC Chair & Vice Chair** - On March 27, the [Criminal Intelligence Coordinating Council](#) (CICC) officially announced the appointments of Mike Sena, Executive Director of the Northern California High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area and Northern California Regional Intelligence Center, as the new CICC Chair and Tom Ruocco, Chief of the Criminal Investigations Division at the Texas Department of Public Safety, as the new CICC Vice Chair. Mr. Sena has had a diverse law enforcement career beginning 1993, serving with multiple agencies, and in 2012, he was appointed to his current position as the executive director of both the NC HIDTA and the NCRIC. Mike is also the President of the [National Fusion Center Association](#). Mr. Ruocco has served in law enforcement for nearly 40 years, most of which was with the FBI where he ultimately retired. In 2009, Mr. Ruocco was appointed chief of the Criminal Law Enforcement Division with the Texas Department of Public Safety. - **First Step Act Implementation** - Earlier this week, the Department of Justice released further information on the implementation progress of the First Step Act. DOJ announced that the Hudson Institute will host the Independent Review Committee, which will assist DOJ as it develops and implements risk and needs assessment tools and evidence-based recidivism reduction programs. - **Opioid Grants** - Last week, BJA released the fiscal year 2019 Comprehensive Opioid Abuse Program (COAP) solicitation. This grant seeks applications for projects that are locally driven responses to the opioid epidemic; statewide implementation, enhancement, and evaluation projects; and Harold Rogers prescription monitoring program implementation and enhancement projects. **Marijuana protections bill gets support of Doug Collins, key House panel's ranking Republican**

Rep. Doug Collins of Georgia, the ranking Republican on the House Judiciary Committee, put his support Monday behind a bipartisan marijuana proposal that would establish protections for states that vote to defy federal prohibition. Mr. Collins and Rep. Suzanne Bonamici, Oregon Democrat, both signed on as co-sponsors to the Strengthening the Tenth Amendment Through Entrusting States Act of 2019, or STATES Act, bringing the bill's total number of backers in the House to 28. **Continue reading** [here](#).

**Bait and smuggle: Mexican cartels divert border cops with migrant surges and ferry drugs where the coast is clear**

A northern Texas sheriff says his county has seen a big uptick in methamphetamine and heroin seizures since October, saying Mexican drug smugglers are using large groups of migrants to divert Border Patrol's attention while they run narcotics over the border in nearby areas. Tarrant County Sheriff Bill E. Waybourn told the Washington Examiner drug seizures have picked up since 2016 and spiked "tremendously" in the past six months just as groups of 100 or more people began showing up at the border. Data from the county, which includes Forth Worth, shows nine pounds of meth was seized in 2016. In 2018, that figure jumped to 22 pounds. In the past six months, 110 pounds of meth have been discovered by the sheriff's department. **Continue reading** [here](#).

Tens of millions of people use smart speakers and their voice software to play games, find music or trawl for trivia. Millions more are reluctant to invite the devices and their powerful microphones into their homes out of concern that someone might be listening. Sometimes, someone is. Amazon.com Inc. employs thousands of people around the world to help improve the Alexa digital assistant powering its line of Echo speakers. The team listens to voice recordings captured in Echo owners' homes and offices. The recordings are transcribed, annotated and then fed back into the software as part of an effort to eliminate gaps in Alexa's understanding of human speech and help it better respond to commands. **Continue reading [here](#).**

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## Legislation on the Floor This Week

**House:**

**[H.Con.Res. 16](#) - Authorizing the use of the Capitol Grounds for the National Peace Officers Memorial Service and the National Honor Guard and Pipe Band Exhibition**

**Status:** Approved by the House on 4/8.

**Summary:** This concurrent resolution permits the Grand Lodge of the Fraternal Order of Police and its auxiliary to sponsor as free public events on the Capitol grounds the 38th Annual National Peace Officers Memorial Service, on May 15, 2019, to honor the law enforcement officers who died in the line of duty during 2018; and the National Honor Guard and Pipe Band Exhibition, on May 14, 2019, to allow law enforcement representatives to exhibit their ability to demonstrate Honor Guard programs and provide for a bagpipe exhibition.

**[H.R. 639](#) - To amend section 327 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act to clarify that National Urban Search and Rescue Response System task forces may include Federal employees**

**Status:** Approved by the House on 4/8.

**Summary:** This bill amends the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act to specify that National Urban Search and Rescue Response System task forces may include federal employees.

**[H.R. 2021](#) - Investing for the People Act of 2019**

**Status:** Possible consideration in the House this week.

**Summary:** This bill increases discretionary spending limits, modifies the procedures for enforcing the limits, and establishes budget enforcement procedures in the House of Representatives for FY2020. The bill increases both the defense and nondefense discretionary spending limits for FY2020 and FY2021. Federal discretionary spending caps would increase by about \$358 billion over two years compared with current law. The nondefense cap would be \$631 billion, \$88.9 billion more than the current fiscal 2020 limit, allowing \$34 billion more than in fiscal 2019.

House Homeland Security Committee - Joint Border Security & Intelligence Subcommittees Hearing - April 2  
[Supporting a Fact-Based Approach to Preventing Terrorist Travel to the United States](#)



**Summary:** This hearing examined efforts to prevent potential terrorists from traveling to the U.S. Some members of the committee expressed concerns with the Administration's travel ban on individuals coming to the U.S. from certain countries. Members of the committee heard from witnesses from the National Targeting Center and the National Vetting Center. Members asked how individuals who want to travel to the U.S. are vetting, what data sets are used, and how those data sets are being expanded. Additionally, witnesses were asked what is being done to ensure those from visa waiver countries are being vetted. Biometrics was also discussed, as well as combing through individuals social media posts looking for potential threats or clues of potential radicalization.

House Appropriations Committee - Homeland Security Subcommittee Hearing - April 2

[FY 2020 Budget Hearing – Transportation Security Administration](#)

**Summary:** This hearing examined the proposed FY 2020 budget for the TSA. Administrator Pekoske laid out TSA's priorities including technology, right-sizing the workforce, raising the global bar of aviation security, and revising the federal air marshal service. Members of the committee asked the Administrator about the recent government shutdown and how the agency was able to managed itself through it, while continuing to maintain operations and security. Additionally, members also expressed concerns with our ability to adequately track and safely move hazardous materials around the country. The Administrator stated that they are in the process of restructuring that will put under the direct control of now an assistant administrator for surface transportation security operations. Additionally, they are looking to forward in the next couple of years initiatives in research and development. Concerns were also raised with employment retention and what the agency is doing to maintain employees.

Senate Appropriations Committee - Homeland Security Subcommittee Hearing - April 3

[Fiscal Year 2020 funding request and budget justification for the Federal Emergency Management Agency](#)

**Summary:** This hearing examined the proposed FY 2020 FEMA budget. Senators asked the Acting Administrator about the Disaster Relief Fund, and sought assurances that the amounts being asked for disaster relief in the budget was adequate. Senators also asked the Administrator about the preparedness grants. Administrator Gaynor stated that the grants have not kept up with current needs and future innovation, and instead in many circumstance have been used for maintenance and sustainment. He also discussed the proposed BRIC grant would be a competitive grant going towards the best pre-disaster mitigation projects.

House Appropriations Committee - CJS Subcommittee Hearing - April 4

[Federal Bureau of Investigation Budget Request for FY 2020](#)

**Summary:** FBI Director Wray testified at this budget hearing on the agency's proposed budget request. Director Wray was asked about concerns with white supremacist violence, in which he stated there is a "persistent, pervasive threat" posed by white supremacist violence. Additionally, he stated that the FBI remains concerned with lone offender attacks. Director Wray also stated that it is difficult to combat domestic terrorism because of its diffuse nature, as well as the use of social media to recruit and radicalize. Director Wray also discussed his growing concerns with cyber threats, as well as the increasing problem of "going dark", the ability of law enforcement to gain access to digital information. Also, the opioid epidemic was brought up and what is being done to combat this growing concern. Director Wray discussed the Darknet, transnational organized crime, prescription drug initiative, and Safe Streets Task Forces. Additionally, Director Wray was asked about the Mueller report, of which he stated he has not seen the final report.

Senate Homeland Security Committee - Full Committee Hearing - April 4

[Unprecedented Migration at the U.S. Southern Border: By the Numbers](#)

**Summary:** This border security hearing heard from individuals discussing the numbers of individuals who are attempting to make it across our southern border into the U.S., either by using the asylum process, or sneaking across the border. The surge in the number of individuals who are attempting to cross the border, in particular unaccompanied children, has put a strain on our resources. Additionally, concerns were raised with criminal gang members coming across the border is a tremendous concern. One issue the witnesses mentioned that we need to do is get better data on exactly how much money the cartels are making off of smuggling, additionally they stated we need to do a better job at putting out more timely the numbers of those trying to enter the country, so we have a better picture of the true nature of the situation at the border. Additionally, witnesses discussed the circular flow of drugs coming across the border into the U.S., while money and guns flow back into Mexico. Witnesses also stated that while numbers vary among the groups of individuals crossing the border,



approximately 60 percent of individuals will appear for their asylum hearing, while 40 percent will not appear. Additionally, aid to the Central American countries where we have seen most of the migration coming from was discussed. Witnesses explained the importance of this aid to improve the conditions in those countries to alleviate the reasons for those who are fleeing.

**Summary:** To strengthen programs authorized under the Debbie Smith Act of 2004.

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## Legislation Considered Last Week

### House:

#### [H.R. 1433 – DHS MORALE Act](#)

**Status:** Approved by the House on 4/1.

**Summary:** To amend the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to improve morale within the Department of Homeland Security workforce by conferring new responsibilities to the Chief Human Capital Officer, establishing an employee engagement steering committee, requiring action plans, and authorizing an annual employee award program, and for other purposes.

#### [H.R. 1593 – CLASS Act of 2019](#)

**Status:** Approved by the House on 4/1.

**Summary:** To amend the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to establish a school security coordinating council, and for other purposes.

#### [H.R. 1590 – Terrorist and Foreign Fighter Travel Exercise Act of 2019](#)

**Status:** Approved by the House on 4/1.

**Summary:** To require an exercise related to terrorist and foreign fighter travel, and for other purposes.

#### [H.R. 1589 – CBRN Intelligence and Information Sharing Act of 2019](#)

**Status:** Approved by the House on 4/1.

**Summary:** To amend the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to establish chemical, biological, radiological, and nuclear intelligence and information sharing functions of the Office of Intelligence and Analysis of the Department of Homeland Security and to require dissemination of information analyzed by the Department to entities with responsibilities relating to homeland security, and for other purposes.

#### [H.R. 1585 – Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2019](#)

**Status:** Approved by the House on 4/4.

**Summary:** To reauthorize the Violence Against Women Act of 1994, and for other purposes. This legislation also reauthorizes the Debbie Smith Act.

### Senate:

#### [H.R. 268 - Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2019](#)

**Status:** Failed to Invoke cloture in the Senate on 4/1; Cloture motion approved by the Senate on 3/28; Approved by the House on 1/16.

**Summary:** This bill provides \$12.1 billion in FY2019 supplemental appropriations to several federal departments and agencies for expenses related to the consequences of recent wildfires, hurricanes, volcanos, earthquakes, typhoons, and other natural disasters. The funding provided by this bill is designated as emergency spending, which is exempt from discretionary spending limits and other budget enforcement rules.
